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Medical Commission: WHY

Purpose

- Protect the public by assuring quality healthcare is provided by physicians (MD) and physician assistants (PA).
- 2. Establishes, monitors, and enforces qualifications for:
 - Licensure
 - consistent standards of practice,
 - continuing competency.
- 3. Rules, policies, and procedures developed by the WMC promote the delivery of quality healthcare to the people in Washington.





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Medical Commission: WHAT

- Establish qualifications to become licensed in WA.
- Establish and monitor compliance with continuing education requirements;
- Ensure consistent standards of practice;

- Assess, investigate and make recommendations related to complaints against physicians and physician assistants;
- Serve as reviewing members on disciplinary cases and disciplinary hearing panels;
- Develop rules, policies and procedures;









Important Terms

• EHR: Electronic Health Record

• A digital version of a patient's paper chart.

• EMR: Electronic Medical Records

• A digital version of the paper charts *in the clinician's office*. An EMR contains the medical and treatment history of the patients in one practice.

CARES Act

• The Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act, also known as the CARES Act, is a \$2.2 trillion economic stimulus bill passed by the 116th U.S. Congress and signed into law by President Donald Trump on March 27, 2020, in response to the economic fallout of the COVID-19 pandemic in the United States.

Affordable Care Act (ACA)

• The law addresses health insurance coverage, health care costs, and preventive care. The law was enacted in two parts: The Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act was signed into law on March 23, 2010 and was amended by the Health Care and Education Reconciliation Act on March 30, 2010.

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WMC & SBOH

Washington Medical Commission

- Oversees MDs and PAs.
- Enforces Standards of Practice and Competency of MDs and PAs.
- Rules and policies impact these specific healthcare providers.
- Rules are enforced through the complaint process.

State Board of Health

- Public Health Issues
 - Drinking Water
 - Onsite sewage systems
 - Newborn screening
 - Immunizations
 - And others
- Delegates enforcement of rules to the Department of Health (DOH) and local health jurisdictions.

What is a Patient Portal?

Patients can view health information such as:

- Recent doctor visits;
- Discharge summaries;
- Medications;
- Immunizations;
- Allergies;
- Lab results;

Some patient portals allow you to:

- Securely message your doctor;
- Request prescription refills;
- Schedule non-urgent appointments;
- Check benefits and coverage;
- Update contact information;
- Make payments;

What is an EHR?

- Electronic Health Records (EHRs) are built to go beyond standard clinical data collected in a provider's office and are inclusive of a broader view of a patient's care.
- EHRs contain information from all the clinicians involved in a patient's care and all authorized clinicians involved in a patient's care can access the information to provide care to that patient.
- EHRs also share information with other health care providers, such as laboratories and specialists.
- EHRs follow patients to the specialist, the hospital, the nursing home, or even across the country.

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How does an EHR Improve Healthcare?

- Reducing the incidence of medical error by improving the accuracy and clarity of medical records.
- Making the health information available, reducing duplication of tests, reducing delays in treatment, and patients well informed to take better decisions.
- Reducing medical error by improving the accuracy and clarity of medical records.

How to Discuss your EHR with your Provider

- Because most providers use EHRs, there may be mistakes in the parts of the record that are dragged into the note 'automatically'.
- Your doctor may not personally review every piece of information in the chart, they rely upon many others to do this 'data entry' work.
- Much of the past medical history is put into the record by computer algorithms or people with minimal medical training. Consequently, there may be mistakes.
- It is helpful for patients to review their chart via the patient portal and bring a list of questions or mistakes they see to the office.
- Your provider or hospital may have a specific procedure for correction. Contact them for details.









Making Changes to your EHR

- We don't have the authority to force a practitioner change the EHR/EMR, but you should look at it regularly and talk to your provider.
- Some organizations or providers may have a process for amending a EHR – So double check with the administrative staff.
- Use the message portal if you have an issue – but wait for the full picture to develop.
 - More information may be coming (like test results) that could result in an update to the record.
